Terry Lindley whose life has been dedicated to agriculture and community service was honored with the Spirit of Sonoma County Award for his many contributions to Sonoma County Farm Bureau and his unwavering support to agriculture, farm youth and the Sonoma County Fair.

As an executive of the largest agricultural lending institution in the region, Lindley has taken an active role in strengthening the agricultural community through his leadership and financial support. He has been the driving force behind many community events including the Santa Rosa Chamber of Commerce's Agribusiness Barbecue, which has been held for the last 40 years to build lasting relationships between the urban and rural sectors of Sonoma County.

The Spirit of Sonoma Award winners are chosen based on their contributions to the economic development and enhancement of the communities in which they live, work, and conduct business through donations of their time and expertise in support of local business and in helping others. Lindley was born and raised on a family ranch in Humboldt County where he was an award-winning member of the Future Farmers of America. After high school, he moved to Santa Rosa and studied agriculture business at Santa Rosa Junior College and became active in the Sonoma County Young Farmers and Ranchers. Following his graduation from SRJC, he started working at what is today American AgCredit, the leading farm lending institution in Sonoma County and the North Coast region.

Lindley worked his way up in the company from loan officer to chief marketing officer during his career, which now spans nearly 40 years. In addition, he is the owner of Lindley Cattle Company, which owns and manages 400 head of commercial beef cattle that graze on land in Sonoma, Mendocino and Humboldt counties.

Lindley is a self-made businessman and entrepreneur who is on everyone's "A" list when something needs to be done related to Sonoma County agriculture and agricultural Grape Growers.

He has been recognized for his contributions and leadership in the agricultural industry.
